About Us...

The Urban Assembly school of Music and art is a small college preparatory art high school located in the heart of downtown Brooklyn. We integrate arts learning and self-expression into our curriculum and engage students through visits to museums, galleries, cultural institutions and internships focusing on engagement through direct self-expression through the arts. We celebrate the diversity of our students and make strong connections to the communities we serve. It is expected that students will complete majority of their high school regents based requirements by the end of their sophomore year so that they can earn up to 16 college credits in our early college academy by the end of their senior year.

Early College Academy

The early college academy provides a liberal/ performing arts based college course of study embedded within the UAMA curriculum. By participating with Bard College, The New School, Pratt, Medgar Evers and NYU, students will have the opportunity to take credit-bearing courses, in the beginning of their junior year. Seminar classes will emphasize critical thinking, textual analysis, the performing arts, and intellectual inquiry across all of the disciplines. Our unique early college program prepares students for the college classroom in a setting that underscores the importance of intellectual engagement: students (and Faculty) participation structures self-expression, informal writing in the classroom, group performances/ exercises, and active debate of questions and concerns at the heart of texts.

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A trip to Ellis Island Museum

The New Technology

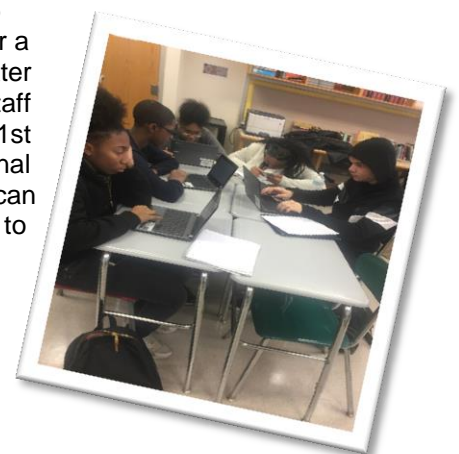
SPRINT 1 Million Project @UAMA

The Urban Assembly for Music and Art (UAMA) is pleased to announce that we have begun to provide **1:1 technology to every UAMA student**. Just like college and the world of work, UAMA students need to be able to work inside and out of school, virtually and in-person, on mobile technology or using a pen and paper, so we want all of our students to be connected! Through a partnership with Sprint, we are able to provide smart phones with wireless hotspots to every UAMA student in grades 9-12. The phone comes with 3 GB of free monthly high-speed data to use for research, homework, and overall academic enrichment through technology. The wireless hotspot also enables parents to connect to the internet either through the phone or with their own device so that they can log on to IO Education/Pupil Path where they have 24/7 access to their students assignments, grades, and attendance information. This technology will enable real-time connection between our students, families, and school, and will open the door to information about college, scholarships, jobs, and new possibilities.



The Chromebooks are in!

Chromebooks are being introduced to classes that already incorporate Google Classroom and other digital educational tools. Students in AP Language and Composition are using their Chromebooks in class (and their Sprint Devices out of class) to research and prepare pro and con arguments for a formal debate. As the school moves toward greater technological integration we are engaged as a staff in collaborating on how to best integrate these 21st Century learning tools not just to replace traditional pen and paper, but to also rethink how students can interact with the skills and knowledge they need to be college and career ready.

The Bard Early College Academy at the Urban Assembly School of Music and Art (UAMA) enables UAMA students in 11th and 12th grade to enroll as part-time undergraduate students of Bard College and earn **tuition-free college credits** concurrently with their high school studies. Participating students take a liberal arts college course of study that aims to intellectually engage UAMA students and help them prepare for and succeed in college.

The Bard Early College Academy establishes an academic extension of Bard College at the UAMA. College courses are taught by Bard Early College faculty, and take place on the UAMA campus within the UAMA course schedule. Additionally, students participate in field trips, including conferences and academic events on the Bard College campus in Annandale-on-Hudson, and joint programming with Bard's other early colleges in the tri-state area. Upon completion of the Bard Seminar sequence, **UAMA students have the opportunity to earn as much as a semester of Bard College credits, tuition-free.**
